

## Texas vs. United States: What's at Stake for Veterans

In *Texas vs. United States*, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals is now deciding a lawsuit brought by Texas and certain other states challenging the constitutionality of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). A different group of states, along with the House of Representatives, is opposing Texas. If the lawsuit succeeds, either in the Fifth Circuit or the U.S. Supreme Court, the ACA will be repealed. The Trump administration supports this lawsuit.

Experts have already assessed the potential impact of ACA repeal on veterans. Soon after the U.S. House of Representatives passed the American Health Care Act (AHCA) in 2017, as part of an ultimately failed attempt to "repeal and replace" the ACA, the nonpartisan RAND corporation released state-by-state estimates of the legislation's impact on veterans.¹ Taking into account coverage provided by the Veterans' Administration, RAND found that, by 2020, 494,841 veterans would lose all health insurance coverage due to the ACA repeal. By 2026, 689,077 veterans would become completely uninsured (Table 1). Figure 1 puts those results in context:

## The number of veterans losing their insurance by 2020, soon after ACA repeal, is —

- » Larger than the number of soldiers currently serving in the U.S. Army
- » More than twice the number of all active-duty military who served in Iraq and Afghanistan in 2008, when troop levels in those two theaters of war were at their peak

## The number of veterans losing their insurance as of 2026 —


- Exceeds the number of soldiers now serving in the U.S. Army and the Marine Corps combined, plus 10% of the Navy
- Is more than three times the number of soldiers who served in Iraq and Afghanistan in 2008
- Exceeds the number of American soldiers who served in Vietnam at the peak of U.S. troop levels in 1968

If federal judges overturn the ACA, the number of veterans losing all health insurance will exceed the size of the U.S. Army and Marine Corps combined.

July 2019 Analysis

RAND found that the ACA cut the number of uninsured veterans by more than one-third (36%) through expanding Medicaid and providing financial assistance that helps people buy private health insurance. Reversing those steps would take a terrible toll on those who served our nation.

We owe a massive debt to America's veterans, who put their lives on the line to defend this country. Many still suffer from the wounds of war. It would be a cruel and profound disservice for the federal courts to repay these veterans' boundless self-sacrifice by callously withdrawing the health care coverage so many of them need to thrive and even survive.

<sup>2</sup> RAND estimated the impact in 2015 under conditions that were estimated to result from ACA repeal by 2020 and then by 2026. The estimated differences in coverage thus resulted entirely from projected policy changes, without regard to anticipated demographic changes after 2015.

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
